FOG Theatre

Formed in 1991, FOG Theatre is a performance based arts program for adults with disability, supported by the City of Port Phillip. They are highly regarded in promoting and increasing the capacity and autonomy of people with disability through the provision of high quality community arts activities which cultivate health and wellbeing, social and community participation, improved learning and choice and control.

Fog Theatre is directed by Nilgun Guven and supported by David Maney, Rachel Edward and Marjetka MacMahon-Krisanic, all qualified arts workers. Currently there are 17 performers in the ensemble and a team of Peer Facilitators with disability who hold leadership positions in Fog Theatre.

Fog Theatre's bold artistic practice, dynamic reputation and culture of inclusivity has resulted in the presentation and screenings of numerous critically acclaimed works, including cumulus nimbus, 3.15 to Brunswick, Shine a Light and their recent production Signature comprising of live multimedia performances and accompanying guided meditation video made in collaboration with artist Kate Geck.

Melissa graduated from Ignition Theatre Training (NMIT) in 2007. She joined Fog Theatre in 2008 and has performed in Forest of the Gongs (2010), Cumulus Nimbus (2011) and Signature (2019). As a member of Rollercoaster Theatre (2010) she has performed in Realeyes (2011), The Noahs (2013), For the love of Pina (2015), and Fish (2017) at the Melba Spiegeltent.

Melissa has studied rhythmic gymnastics (Australian Champion Special Olympics), voice, piano and dance. Currently she is a dance member of e.motion 21 and travelled to India and performed at the World Downs Syndrome Conference in Chennai, the Australian Embassy in New Delhi and at the Taj Mahal (2015).

Clem Baade

Clement Baade started his acting career at St. Martins Youth Centre back in 1991 as the Director's right hand person. He joined Rawcus in 2000, he is also a Peer Facilitator/performer at Fog Theatre. In the year 2010 he performed in "A Brief History About My Body" directed by Ingrid Voorendt at the Victorian Collage of the Arts.


"I love Fog Theatre. I have been with Fog for nearly 30 years and since then, until now, I have seen lots of changes and it is a good thing."
